

Ann Maria Reeves Jarvis promoted a Mother's Day for mothers of soldiers in the American Civil War (1861– 1865). She founded "Mothers' Day Work Clubs" to improve sanitation and health in the cities, and care for wounded soldiers on both sides. Her daughter Anna Marie Jarvis, who lived in Grafton- West-Virginia, continued these efforts after her mother's death in 1905 and succeeded to make Mother's Day a legal holiday in 1914 under President Wilson.

Unfortunately the commercialization of Mothers' Day

embittered her. She was upset that Mothers Day was being turned into just another holiday, where stores make extra money by selling candy and items that say "Happy Mother's Day". The rest of her life she fought to undo Mother's Day. She said: "How can a card or some candy ever honor a mother? Are we too lazy to do something more for the woman who has done more for us than anyone in the world?"

God makes it very clear: Honor your father and your mother, every day of the year! Prayerfully, let us make that our goal for the rest of our lives! -StM
