<u>Last week</u> Malango School celebrated the benefits of *sowing*; this week the benefits of *sew-ing*.

Huh?? What am I referring to?

Last week you had a fun dress up day (dressing in autumn and Harvest colours) to celebrate Harvest season, in which we reap the benefits of 'sowing'. The bible speaks much about sowing and reaping and harvests.

Gal 6 mentions 2 types of harvests: the harvest of a <u>carnal</u> life (v.7-8), and the harvest of the <u>spiritual</u> life (v.8-10). Here we read that <u>We reap what we sow</u>. So we need to **sow** to please the Spirit to reap eternal life, and keep doing good to reap a spiritual harvest.

How nicely this ties in with this week. One way you sow to reap a spiritual harvest is to SEW- or have a Spiritual Emphasis Weekwhich is just what you are doing Thursday-Saturday. As you focus this week on **SEW**, may you each learn to cultivate the fruit of the Spirit in your own lives in order to sow and reap a spiritual harvest that will benefit both you and others as you walk in the Spirit. > "Give thanks in all circumstances, for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus."




Gecko

We all know the Gecko, eating insects in our houses. How is it possible that he runs so



easily over the ceiling? Look at the picture of its foot on vertical glass. The toes have adhesive lamellas. Every square millimeter contains about 14,000 hairs (setae), about 30x thinner than a human hair. Each of them is tipped with 100 - 1,000 spatulae that stick to any surface

like adhesive papers. For the chemists among us: these adhesive forces are "van der Waals" forces between the molecules on these spatula and the surface.



The hairs/setae on

the feet of Geckos are self cleaning and will usually remove any clogging dirt within a few steps. Teflon, which has very low "van der Waals" forces, is the only known surface to which a Gecko cannot stick.

Geckos' toes are designed to bend in the opposite direction as well to allow them to peel their toes off surfaces from the tips inward.

A typical mature Gecko using its full adhesive power is capable of holding aloft a weight of 133 kg (290 lb)! Each hair/seta can resist 10 atmospheres of pull.

This means a Gecko can support about eight times its weight hanging from just one toe on smooth glass.

Tyre companies study the Gecko to learn from its design. Tyres with more or less the same design would be very interesting. We could drive upside down through a tunnel! But these prototypes are by far not as efficient as the Geckotoe. I think that God smiled (and the angels as well) when he designed the Gecko. Again.... "and God saw that it was good".
